OP-ED: What it's like to be an Epidemiologist in the Time of Covid by Madison Liford

I am an epidemiologist at the University of Kentucky. I have lived in Pensacola Park for two years—first on Pensacola Drive and now Wabash. Working as an epidemiologist during the COVID-19 pandemic has been a unique experience. Largely, COVID has impacted my life in the same ways it's impacted everyone else's: cancelled vacations, empty social calendars, remote work. As an epidemiologist, I focus primarily on occupational safety and drug overdoses. My work is more interested in the impact of COVID on these areas than the virus itself. Still, in the public health world, the presence of COVID is palpable. Collaborative meetings and workgroups have been sidelined as colleagues are pulled into COVID-related work. There is a general feeling of an overarching burden stretching resources to capacity.

The biggest impacts of COVID for me as an epidemiologist have been personal. I always loved sensationalized stories about novel outbreaks like Contagion or 28 Days Later, but I never considered epidemiology as a legitimate career until I started working as a HIV/AIDS focused Peace Corps volunteer after college. Epidemiology wasn't on the radar of my friends and family either. My friend Laura would ask repeatedly, "epidemiology, is that working with insects?" COVID certainly changed that. My profession was thrust into the spotlight. Now everyone knows what an epidemiologist is.

I never would have predicted that a once-in-a-lifetime pandemic would occur in the first few years of my career. While I recognize the devastating impact COVID has had for so many, I also have to acknowledge the privilege of working in public health through this historic event. Surprisingly, one of my largest takeaways from COVID has been the response of those around me. Social media has created a platform for public opinion. It is a novel experience to hear people comment on my profession. Ultimately, I'm glad people care enough to talk about public health. I hope this pandemic highlights the importance of public health and that this heightened interest carries beyond COVID.

The votes have been cast; thank you so much for everyone who partook in the voting. We had over one hundred people write in! It was neck and neck with Option A (with the railroad track) and Option B (with the leaf), so we went back to Cricket Press and asked them to merge the two, and this is what they came up with. Questions from the neighborhood (if you have any questions, please email us at pensacolapark@gmail.com):

Q: I believe I saw an LFUCG code enforcement vehicle pulled in front of my house. How do I tell if code enforcement has been called on my property?

A: The simplest way to find out if you have had code enforcement called on your property is to call them at 859-258-3270. They will be able to tell you if someone has reported your property in violation of anything, they can also inform you if it has been in violation in the past (and you may have never known). Other than that, if you do not wish to call in, just wait for a letter in the mail. Code violations are usually reported within 1-3 business days.

Q: I would like to replace my existing vinyl windows with new ones. Since they are replacement windows, can I still replace in kind and do I need to get a Certificate of Appropriateness (COA)?

A: From our understanding, you will always need to get a COA when doing work on the exterior of your home (there are some exceptions which involve general upkeep, but replacement would generally trigger a COA). As to if they would allow new vinyl windows to replace old vinyl windows, this would more than likely be a case-by-case scenario, and we strongly encourage

anyone with historic questions to reach out to Amelia Armstrong, with the Lexington Historic Preservation office, at 859-258-3265. Also please be aware that if you are not satisfied with the outcome of a historic staff answer, you can always take up your case with the Board of Architectural Review (B.O.A.R.)

Q: I am new to the area. Can I join both WGPL and PPNA?

A: Yes, if you live within the respective boundaries of either organization you are FREE to join. WGPL is one of 250 registered neighborhood and homeowner associations in Lexington-Fayette county. The streets included are Wabash, Goodrich, Pensacola Drive, and Lackawanna (which makes up its acronym). In contrast, the Pensacola Park Neighborhood Association (PPNA) oversees Pensacola Park, which is listed as a local, state, and historic place. It includes the WGPL streets, along with Nicholasville Road (from Goodrich to Suburban), Penmoken, Rosemont (down to the railroad tracks), and Suburban. Both organizations seek to better the neighborhood and would love your involvement.




bluebells, hyacinth, and grape hyacinth. Hint: Squirrels love tulips and crocus.
