

# SUPPORT LOCAL: ReSTORE by Barbara Szubinska

Spring cleaning season will be upon us soon, and I hope that before you "Marie Kondo" that rocking chair, you might consider donating it to Habitat for Humanity's ReStore. Located just a mile away, at 451 Southland Dr., ReStore is like a year-round yard sale. On a recent trip, I found a large stack of brand-new coffee makers next to a kitchen sink. Our son's first apartment was furnished mostly from ReStore. We still chuckle about one-dollar place settings of plates, bowls and cups donated by Olive Garden (now, repurposed as pet feeding dishes) and the sturdy futon that went back to ReStore once the owner could afford a new couch.

ReStore is a part of Habitat for Humanity, a non-profit. Restore's sales help support Habitat's mission of building affordable homes for families in need. The first ReStore opened in 1991 in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Now, there are 920 stores in 5 countries. Together, the stores have raised over \$100 million to build and repair homes for low-income folks. Habitat for Humanity operates in all 50 states, and in over 70 countries. Working at the ReStore also provides the participating families a way to satisfy the requirement of volunteer hours since not all can install drywall or paint. Other requirements include a financial literacy course since families do pay for their homes through a low-interest mortgage.

In addition to generating funds for building homes, ReStore helps divert tons of materials from entering the landfills. They accept furniture

(except broken/torn), rugs, cabinets, sinks, tubs, and toilets, lamps and lights, appliances (large and small), building materials, paint, gardening and lawn care some implements, books, and electronics. Pick up available is larger items, such as grills, couches, and large appliances. Volunteers will also help remove items such as cabinets. Call (859) 252-2224 to schedule.

So, before you haul to the curb the patio set that no longer sparks joy, try taking it to the ReStore so others might give it a new life.

# **QUESTIONS FROM THE NEIGHBORHOOD:**

WHAT IS GOING ON WITH THE 1847 NICHOLASVILLE ROAD PROPERTY? IT LOOKS LIKE CONSTRUCTION HAS BEEN HALTED?

1847 Nicholasville Road, now under a new address, has been changed from 8 townhomes to 4 single-family residences. The developer pulled their building permit without having to go through the review requirements set forth by the H-1 overlay guidelines; while others in the neighborhood, who submitted their building permits, at the exact same time, had to comply. The neighborhood quickly mobilized, raised money for a lawyer, and appealed this decision with circuit court, which is where it currently stands.


