Pensacola Park Neighborhood Association is having our annual plant sale to raise money for Pensacola Park. 100% of all proceeds go towards future matching grants and neighborhood improvements for the neighborhood, and future publications of Pensacola Park Posts. WHO/WHAT WILL BE THERE?

- PPNA will be selling perennial, vegetable, and houseplants to raise money.
- Local neighborhood artists will be selling their items at their own booths.
- Donations this year are from: neighbors providing plants, down to earth donating leftover plants from their sale (the weekend prior to ours), and sunshine grow house providing plants; gift cards for our raffle this year will be from: King's Garden Center, Landscaper's Corner, Wilsons Nurseries, and Good Food Coop.

CAN YOU STILL DONATE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE EVENT?

Yes.

If you still have PLANTS to donate, please make sure to drop them off to the porch of 1859 Nicholasville Rd. no later than Monday the 15th; this gives us a chance to price them out before the event. Please make sure that all plants being dropped off have been potted up with soil. If you need a pot or soil, we have some of these available on the same porch listed. All freshly dug plants need at least 4 days to recuperate in a pot, otherwise we would have a lot of wilty plants at the plant sale.

If you are wanting to showcase your art or crafts, it is \$20 dollars to showcase at the event. Please let us know before hand, and if you need a table and chairs (we cannot provide a tent for shade). There is no wifi at the event, so please make sure you have the ability to do cellular or be able to get a hotspot. There is also no electricity at the event.

MARK YOUR CALENDARS:

- June: The neighborhood summer solstice picnic will take place on June 24th at the Goodrich green space (at the end of Goodrich). Grilled burgers/hotdogs, drinks, and chips will be provided by PPNA If you can, bring a dish to share. More information coming in the June newsletter.

WINDSTORM:

While there is no guarantee we can save all our trees when the next windstorm comes, trees with the following attributes have the best chance. In addition to overall health, the trees that have strong roots (deep and extensive), flexible wood, a thick trunk, and are native to our area can usually survive high winds. Certain trees are quite wind resistant. These include, but are not limited to, American Beech, American Holly, American Persimmon, Baldy Cypress, Basswood, Carolina Silverbell, Dawn Redwood, Eastern Red Cedar, Flowering Dogwood, Green Giant Arborvitae, Norway Spruce, Redbud, Southern Magnolia, and Sweetbay. If you're concerned about whether your trees can withstand a windstorm or the general health of the tree(s), contact a local tree company for an assessment. It's better to know the health of your trees than to be surprised during a windstorm.

HISTORY CORNER: U.S. Narcotic Farm by Rebecca C. Glasscock

Seemingly so far removed from our present-day experience was the U.S. Narcotic Farm, established in 1935. At the time, it was considered a place for the humane treatment of drug addiction. Drug addicts could volunteer to come to this hospital, surrounded by a thousand acre farm, for treatment. Concurrently, it was a federal prison that incarcerated convicted addicts. Having these two populations in the same facility was unorthodox, but even more so was the drug and addiction research. While considered the world's epicenter for this type of research, the subjects were prisoners who "volunteered" as guinea pigs for the experiments. They were generally rewarded with bonus doses of heroin. When the U.S. Narcotic Farm opened in 1935, Ralph Brown, a psychologist who moved to 180 Rosemont in 1935, joined the staff as a Psychologist. Within a few years, the name of the facility had been changed to the more anodyne U.S. Public Health Service Hospital. Two more residents of Pensacola Park joined the staff: Wesley Porter (who moved to 156 Wabash in 1942) and Retha Powell (who moved to 156 Goodrich in 1942). Porter served as an attendant and Powell as the sewage plant operator. This facility was certainly one of a kind: the experiments were increasingly scandalous, and concurrently it became associated with a growing drug subculture that included famous jazz musicians and others of renown. In 1967, the name was changed to the National Institute of Mental Health, Clinical Research Center. By the 1970s, as our country's drug policies changed and amidst scandals, the program was shut down. In 1974, the facility became a federal minimum security prison. A book about the facility was written. A documentary, entitled The Narcotic Farm, first aired on public television in 2008.

MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH MONTH

Since 1949, the U.S. has recognized May as Mental Health Awareness Month. This year's theme is "Look around, Look within". If you or someone you know is struggling, the neighborhood is here to help.
